#### MINISTER'S MESSAGE

Christ has died; Christ is risen; Christ will come again.

#### Dear Ones,



Christians from nearly all denominations celebrate Holy Communion at least once a month, though our Catholic friends do so weekly. Also called the Eucharist (which means "thanksgiving") or the Lord's Supper, this sacrament was established by Christ himself in remembrance of his sacrifice, life and teachings. Of course, there are differences, but the basic practice of using bread and wine as tangible representations of the body and blood of Christ has been in existence since the very early days of the founding of the Christian church (water is sometimes used in deference to those who are not able to drink alcohol). In our congregational tradition, grape juice is used and is usually distributed in small cups alongside small pieces of bread (unleavened or leavened) served on a tray.

Sometimes Communion is offered through what is called the "intinction" method (intinction means "to dip") whereby recipients dip small pieces of bread directly into a common cup (of juice or wine) usually held by an ordained minister or priest (a Catholic priest will serve his congregants directly by first dipping the wafer/host into the wine). Intinction originated early on

and is exclusively practiced in both Catholic and Anglican-Episcopal churches. Whether the elements are distributed in cups or by intinction, the function is the same: participants are urged to look within themselves to make sure they are at peace with God and neighbor.

In most churches the fundamental message to the Christian in the rite of Communion is unmistakably repeated whenever it is celebrated by recitation of the following phrase: "Christ has died; Christ is risen; Christ will come again." Saint Paul summed this up when he wrote, "For as often as you eat this bread and drink the cup, you proclaim the Lord's death until he comes." (I Corinthians 11:26) Although it is not the only meaning associated with the life and death of Christ, the dominant and orthodox interpretation is that Jesus died upon the cross for the sins of the world, that he was raised from the dead on Easter morning and that in so doing he conquered death for all humanity, and will return to earth one day to make all things right.

We are now open for in-person worship and are making a week to week decision whether to do so based on the science. On Easter Sunday, April 4th we plan to meet in the sanctuary as we publicly celebrate the resurrection of Jesus, which is a cornerstone of our faith. During the service we will also be sharing the Lord's Supper via easily opened, individualized, prepackaged containers which include a tiny wafer and small amount of juice. Because Jesus has risen, we, too will one day rise! In the meantime we face each day with faith, hope and love. I very much look forward to seeing you in church on Easter morning and throughout the spring.

They will imagine a world where all people have what they need and are treated fairly.

## Sunday April 18<sup>th</sup>: **Blessed Are the Merciful**

Matthew 5:7 Participants will encounter the fifth blessing and promise of the Beatitudes. They will hear the terms "mercy" and "merciful" and contrast mercy to the harshness we see in the world. Participants will hear a grown-up say that God is merciful to us. They will receive a challenge to see the world through lenses of mercy, or "mercy glasses."

## Sunday April 25<sup>th</sup>: **Blessed Are the Pure in Heart**

Matthew 5:8 Participants will encounter the sixth blessing and promise of the Beatitudes. They will hear the term "pure in heart," and explore what it means to integrate our hearts, minds, and bodies to be whole human beings. Participants will hear a grown-up say purity sometimes disrupts the world in order to be faithful. They will receive a challenge to care for others because our hearts are created to love others.

#### **MUSIC NOTES**

No long article on archival mysteries this month! Instead I'm going to summarize some of the issues with our live-streaming of Sunday worship over the last six weeks, and the fixes (permanent, I hope) that have been made.

The problems were plural, and so were the solutions. First, there were conflicts between our wireless devices and others, probably located outside of the church but nearby, in apartments or (For the technicallybusinesses. minded, the conflicts had to do with duplicate IP addresses). Then, on a subsequent Sunday, we discovered that even though everything looked perfect in-house, the signal wasn't being transmitted to our provider and then to the outside world (you at home). One "black-box" device that does this (it's called an encoder) was replaced. But then, over the next few Sundays the audio and video became more and more garbled and intermittent. Our main Comcast modem, which serves the entire building and connects to the Comcast network, was replaced. The

final discovery was that our internet upload speed was unpredictably dropping below the minimum required for intelligible streaming. The solution for that was to upgrade our Comcast service to give us higher speeds. Worship this past Sunday (March 21) worked perfectly. We will keep our fingers crossed that it stays that way.

Both Comcast and our streaming provider, Power Sound of New England (PSNE), agree that many of the above issues, including the conflicting IP addresses and the dropping upload speeds, have to do with the increasing use of wireless streaming over the past year. Homes, schools, businesses, and churches are using more devices and more internet bandwidth. Since most Comcast lines (including ours) are shared, usage by others affects one's own speed. Note too that reception at home of HD video and audio also requires higher download speeds. Your mileage may vary!

#### **BIG THANKS TO JACK!**

Jack Baptist, officially our Sexton, is unofficially our Information Technology Problem Solver. Jack has done this for many years, mostly behind the scenes. Other than Comcast-owned devices (and now, those purchased from PSNE), all of the other equipment in the church building has been installed by Jack, often at minimal or no cost, salvaged from corporate use.

Jack has spent countless hours over the last few months diagnosing problems with our live-streaming. He's gotten us up and running at the last minute on some Sunday mornings. Most importantly, as an IT professional, he speaks the language of the Comcast and PSNE technicians. We've often (half-) joked that Jack, currently retired, could become PSNE's resident technician for the southeast MA region. seriously, the PSNE techs know that they can talk to Jack by phone and he knows what to do at this end. Jack's help has been invaluable, and we are grateful!

#### **Did You Know?**

A number of years ago, Lee Sanford, the long-time Curator of this church, got a call from a gentleman in Raynham who told him a very interesting tale. It seemed that this fellow, whose name is lost to history, had in his possession a civil war gravestone, which, for an unknown number of years, had served as a splash guard at the end of a roof drain on his house. Sacrilege, you say! But it seems that the stone was upside down so there was no telling exactly what it was, least of all a tombstone. Well, one day while doing a little remodeling, the stone was proved to be a genuine civil war marker. Now what to do with it. He couldn't reuse it so he started digging in another direction.

From my personal experience, I know that Raynham has a very extensive genealogy collection, and after much research he did find the man's name and service record.

George A. Tripp Co. H 3rd. Mass. Mil Inf.

But where did the stone originally come from. After checking with the GAR archives, he discovered that veteran's wife was buried in our Hence the call to Lee Kirkyard. Sanford. Arrangements were made and a hole was prepared. The stone weighs a goodly amount and about half of it is below ground. About this time, the late Ed Smith, who was a member of our congregation, was very involved with a civil war re-enactor company and they were only too happy to give George a proper civil war send off. company arrived in full dress uniforms including their rifles. The original plan was to have them fire a salute and then play taps, but the Attleboro Police vetoed the idea of a rifle discharge even if it was only blanks.

In any event taps was played, and the company marched off the field. I missed the civil war because I was too young but I was there for George's funeral.
