## MINISTER’S MESSAGE

*Chronicles of a Grateful Heart.*



“Raise your hand if, when you were in your twenties, this is where you thought you’d be at this stage in your life.” I was at a meeting of fellow ministers not long ago and this was the statement posed by the keynote speaker to an audience made up of people who were all well beyond twenty-something. It’s a thought-provoking experiment. When I was in my twenties, I imagined I’d be a pastor at this time in my life. Just not sure I thought it would be in quite this way, exactly in this place. As many have noted, life is a journey with unexpected twists and turns, filled with crooked detours, and, along the way one experiences joys along with multiple baskets of wasted time. (The best autobiographical title I’ve ever heard was borrowed from a line in Shakespeare: *Chronicles of Wasted Time*.) The fact is, life is about change, even if you stay at the same address, keep the same vocation, and enjoy the same family and group of friends. Living itself brings regret even if we remain wealthy and healthy with children and choices and things and memories that mostly make us proud. There is always a road untaken, a path less traveled that we

didn’t traverse. One can only imagine the sights and sounds and joys that were missed there!

We must regret what we regret and grieve what we need to grieve. It is the human way, and it is the way of the divine. In the Christian calendar we now find ourselves in the midst of the Easter season and, if this means anything it means life from death, hope from despair, and the promise that spring’s bright colors will follow the gray and bleary that was bleak winter. This new season first whispers to wake us from winter’s slumber, and then it shouts, ‘*Peace be still!*’ We must remember to apprehend a grateful heart and show mercy instead of judgment, both to others and to ourselves, especially to ourselves. This is the way creation was meant to be, and the way of our God, too. To be sure, our choices have consequences and so it happens from time to time that those long ago decisions we made, or incidents that happened to us, can end up swallowing our strength and substance. Life brings the seeds of despair and death within it. The good news is that death brings the seeds of life and delight within it as well!

Many lives seem wasted beyond repair. We see a person tossed aside, destroyed by personal choosing and/or things that happened to them that made any hope of a practiced compassion or reception of blessing impossible. From time to time we all experience this lost-ness and the healthier ones among us take the time needed to 'bemoan' their 'outcast state.' In any case, as Easter people we are tasked with finding a necessary grace to serve these embittered ones, for we are all connected and called to be keepers of one another and ourselves. After all, the bitter root can burrow deeply wherever it is allowed entrance for the heart is gatekeeper to both good and evil. As Scripture enjoins, it is we who are strong who must bear the offenses, trials and pains of those who are weak. At one time or another, we have all known bleakness and rejection, despair and loneliness so that even our most eloquent remonstrations are without excuse. Each of us remains in various states of disrepair and dis-ease, in deep need of warmth and succor, because we are all mercy’s orphans.

At that meeting I started to raise my hand, but then thought better of it. “After all,” I reflected, “I am not where I thought I’d be, but *thanks be to God*, I am where I am!”

#### Sunday May 2<sup>nd</sup>:



Matthew 5:9. Participants will encounter the seventh blessing and promise of the Beatitudes. They will develop an understanding of the word "peace" that transcends lack of conflict. Participants will hear a grown-up say that we are all called to be peacemakers, and we are all children of God. They will receive a challenge to make peace in the world around us.

#### Sunday May 9<sup>th</sup>:

Blessed Are Those Who Are Persecuted Matthew 5:10. Participants will encounter the eighth blessing and promise of the Beatitudes. They will become familiar with the word "persecution" and how it relates to the

life of Jesus and the lives of all people who resist injustice. Participants will hear a grown-up say that persecution often happens when we make brave choices. They will receive a challenge to choose the way of righteousness and justice, even if it makes people uncomfortable or frustrated.

#### Sunday May 16<sup>th</sup>:

Blessed Are You When...

Matthew 5:11-12. Participants will encounter the ninth blessing and promise of the Beatitudes. They will consider how we may rejoice even when people misunderstand or persecute us. Participants will hear a grown-up say that children do not have to do this work alone. They will receive a challenge to be a part of an ancient team, a team that partners with God to bring about love and justice.

#### Sunday May 23<sup>rd</sup>:

Coming Down the Mountain

Matthew 4:23-5:12. Participants will reflect on their beatitude journey and wonder together about what it means to come down the mountain with Jesus. Participants will hear a grown-up say that Jesus preached about a world where God blesses those who may seem powerless. God's kingdom looks different from kingdoms of violence, selfishness, and harshness. It is a community of love. They will receive a challenge to descend the mountain with Jesus, bringing everything we have learned into a new perspective for living.

#### Sunday May 31<sup>st</sup>:

Memorial Day – No Sunday School

### Did You Know?

Around the turn of the last century, the name Major Everett S. Horton was very well known at Second Church. Everett Horton was born on June 15, 1836. Little is known of his early years but his rise to fame begins with the Civil War. Several men of the Attleborough area were recruited into a company which elected Everett Horton as a second lieutenant. Gradually he rose through the ranks until he was promoted to major.

On September 30, 1864, Major Horton became a prisoner of war and was held for some time at the infamous Libby Prison. On February 22, 1865 he was paroled and was released to union lines.

After the war he returned to Attleborough and, upon the death of his older brother, became associated with the Horton-Angell Co. Major Horton eventually became the senior partner in that firm.

In later years Major Horton became closely connected with the William Streeter Post of the Grand Army of the Republic (G.A.R.). He was the host of several former P.O.W. reunions at the old Archway Hotel next door to the church.

Major Horton was a lifelong member of Second Church and was held in the greatest respect. In 1903, he was appointed chairman of the committee that would design and erect the church that we use today.

If you are interested, there is a commemorative tablet in our little museum at the bottom of the stairs under the narthex.

Major Horton died on June 3, 1911 and was buried with full military honors in the Old Kirkyard. *Ted Moxham*
