## MINISTER’S MESSAGE

*Jesus saw Nathaniel coming to him, and saith of him,

Dear Friends,

Summer will be here very soon and it is shaping up to be delicious! Masks are coming off, or being cautiously lowered, and people are returning to a semblance of the lives that have cocooned them for the past 15 months. And just like the onset of summertime brings a new energy and fresh hope, so too, does any good beginning. For example, in 2021’s nearly ended spring season, many of us were privileged to attend (at least virtually!) one or more graduations of loved ones who completed their studies. Instead, may we use these sunny hours to express appreciation to the younger generation for reminding us why it is that we are here anyway: to live and laugh and dance and weep together, which is not limited to any specific date or age on the calendar! May God be praised for all of the days of summer and for all the hope and pleasure these warm days bring, whether we be marked by wrinkled skin or otherwise.

We are very busy wrapping up another wonderful year of memory making below the stairs. I am so happy that this school year has been so amazing! In addition to this being my first year as director we were also navigating preschool in a pandemic. The families and staff have all worked together as a team to make this a successful school year. I am looking forward to many more exciting school years ahead!

Above and beyond all of their regular responsibilities, the teachers have spent their spring creating amazing portfolios for EACH child! Over the course of the year, the teachers collect work samples in the form of drawings, paintings and photographs in order to create a "memory book" which we bind and gift to each child at the end of their school year. This is a true labor of love! I adore receiving texts from the teachers when they are working from their "command centers" long after school hours. They truly appreciate the visuals and reflection time that visualizes the growth of each child! The families really treasure these portfolios and children tend to look through them as they get older.

The teachers were celebrated in early May with a beautiful appreciation week. The parents in our program worked together to gift the teachers with a special treat each day of the week. It was a wonderful week and we certainly all felt much appreciated.

We are graduating 24 children from our program this year. Our commencement exercises will take place on **THURSDAY JUNE 3rd**. Admission price is one canned good to support the Second Congregational Church's food pantry.

We are offering 2 weeks of summer camp this summer. Week One is entitled “Super Scientists” and Week Two is “Ocean Adventures.”

We will also be offering a Kindergarten Readiness Camp from 8/16 to 8/19 for children who have graduated from our program and are headed off to Kindergarten in the fall. The curriculum will include a review of K readiness skills and experiences with some of the things they will be doing in the fall. All 3 of our camp weeks are full and we are excited for camp weeks!

**Did You Know?**

As is my usual practice, I cannot take entire credit for this wonderful story. Most of it comes from an old Readers Digest story that I found to be truly amazing.

Quite a number of years ago, an archeologist named Gabriel Barkay was staring through his microscope at a tiny silver scroll. On the scroll were four letters that he could read clearly Y H W H.

“Yahweh” he said softly, the name of God. This tiny scroll was the first object found anywhere in the holy city of Jerusalem that had the name of God inscribed on it. An artist had inscribed those tiny letters 2600 years ago. Solomon’s Temple still stood and the Dead Sea scrolls would not even be written for another 400 years.

There were more letters written but they were all jumbled together and “Gabi” as he was known could not decipher them. This was a moment that transcended science. Gabi thought he felt the air tremble and the hair on the back of his neck stood on end.

As time passed, Gabi found the necessary backing for a new dig under the Scottish Church of St. Andrew’s. Soon the trench began to give up its treasure. The crew found many items,

but Gabi wanted more. Down through the century’s they dug until finally they were digging in the level of the late Iron Age. One day a graduate student discovered what looked like a cigarette butt. She called to Gabi, and what they were staring at was a small purple, much corroded silver amulet. For the next two and one half years Gabi tried to unroll the bracelet. After many tries, he was finally successful and that’s when he first noticed the letters Y H W H. Looking through his microscope he noticed another Y H W H but there the matter stood until 1986. At that time the Israel Museum was preparing artifacts for an exhibition. A graphic artist was retained to make a drawing of the amulet. In the course of her work she noticed something that the others had missed, a third Y H W H. She realized that the only time the name of God is used three times is in the Priestly Benediction. They are the words that Moses brought from God to Aaron to bless the people. In the same language that these words were etched on the silver scrolls 2600 years ago, in the same city of Jerusalem, they are said in synagogues today. They are also said in Catholic and Protestant churches including our own.

This is the prayer almost word for word the Priestly Benediction in Numbers 6:24-26 and very close to the blessings in Psalms 67-1 and 4-6 that was etched on those ancient scrolls

*“The Lord bless you and keep you;*

*“The Lord make his face to shine upon you and be gracious unto you;*

*“The Lord lift up his countenance upon you and grant you peace.”*
