Pastor’s Message



Things were running late at the backyard marriage ceremony. Tension was running high. It was getting dangerously close to “go time.” The father of the bride entered the room frazzled. He had a necktie and a look that revealed he was lost. I said, “Bob, give me the necktie.” I quickly tied it, then loosened it and handed it to a very grateful bride’s father. He pulled it over his head and finished the job. I then said, “Where’s the groom?” Someone shared that he was in the kitchen watching a YouTube video trying to figure out how to tie a bow tie. “Direct me to the kitchen!”

The groom stood in a state of panic watching a bow tie tutorial. I said, “Justin, hand over the tie. I’ve got this.” I stood directly behind him and proceeded to tie the bow tie as if I were putting it on my neck. I figured it was easier to do it myself, than to take the time to teach him! In less than five minutes, which was all we had, I had managed to dress both the groom and father of the bride. I’d like to think that I saved the day—and quite possibly a marriage or two.

These are the things they don’t teach you in seminary. But I digress...

When I earned my Doctor of Ministry degree from Andover Newton Theological School, I jokingly told a friend that I was now going to smoke a pipe and wear tweed blazers with elbow patches and sport a bow tie. His graduation gift to me was a bowtie. The tie hung in the closet taunting me for years. It was a ‘self-tie’ bow tie. If I was going to wear that thing it was going to take some work. After all, how many people can tie one of those things.

Many years later I was serving a church where an older gentleman faithfully wore bow ties to worship. Dave sat in the back pew with a couple older gentlemen, while their wives worshiped in the choir loft. Dave seemed like a nice enough person. He asked me, “Do you sail?” No, I do not. “Do you go to the symphony?” No, I don’t. (Many members of that church were season tickets holders to the theaters.) We were having a hard time ‘connecting.’

I shared with him that I really wanted to learn how to tie a bow tie, but it seemed like a hopeless endeavor. I had tried fruitlessly for years—and it seemed I was destined to a life of boring old neckties. Then he said, “I’ll teach you.” We found it—a connection.

I went over to his house one afternoon, and after several hours trying to teach me—I think I finally got it. I went home and practiced. It took me 30 minutes to get the tie right. I worked at it. On Sunday morning, I was determined to wear that bow tie to worship. Rather than hone my preaching or put finishing touches on a rough sermon, I stood in front of a mirror, adjusting, readjusting, pulling and tightening.

When I stepped up to the pulpit that morning, I looked out and saw Dave beaming. He was so excited, and if I could read lips, I would have sworn he said to his two buddies, “I taught him that.”

When I wear a bow tie—which has kind of become my thing—I think of Dave. I think of the smile that it brought to his face. I think of the amazingly simple gesture of teaching someone how to tie a tie. When I tie the bowtie on Sunday morning now, I think of all the simple ministry opportunities that are out there. Sure, anyone can go to YouTube and get a tutorial (good luck with that!), but the satisfaction that can come from learning or teaching someone else a skill is priceless.

Over the years people have given me bowties that belonged to loved ones. I wear them with pride and honor. {If anyone has been paying attention, you've not yet seen me wear the same bow tie twice.} I wear them also because they usually bring a smile to peoples' faces.

I don't think that Dave knew that on that day he was serving the Lord by teaching me a skill. It seemed at the time that we were just hanging out, drinking coffee and having fun while watching a pastor's patience wear dangerously thin. Dave's story has been told in a thousand different ways over the years. He has been the person who called to check in on me when I wasn't feeling well. He has been the Deacon who told me to "pray and process." He has been the choir member who **told** me she was going to pray for me every day at 2 PM (and I knew at 2 PM that my name was being lifted to the Lord). Dave has been the church member who put in a good word, when others weren't so kind.

What are the ministry opportunities out there for you? Do you have a skill that you could share with others? YOU know so much. You have life experience. You can do small things. You can do great things. You can teach. You may never know how far your gifts go. You may never know the lengths and depths of YOUR ministry. But you do have one—a ministry. Serve.

50 years ago, many people had church brand loyalty. People knew if they were Methodist, Episcopalian or a Congregationalist. Often, if someone moved to a new town, they would first go to the denominational church of their upbringing. Today, things don't quite work out that way. 50 years ago, you had to tell someone why you didn't go to church. These days, you have to explain to people why you go to church. There has been a cultural shift taking place over the last 50 years. This is not surprising news to anyone, especially regular church goers.

One of the cultural and church shifts is that social media is the new evangelism. How do people find out about things these days? Many people learn about things from one of the many social media outlets. People may go to our church website or peruse Facebook for information about upcoming events. Usually, before I go to someplace new, I check out their website. I am not alone in this. Also, people can watch from afar and make up their minds whether they want to join us or not.

A few of us in the church have talked about a 'brand.' What if our church had a catchy vision statement- that could easily be put on bumper stickers or t-shirts? We could wear the shirts when we represent the church in community events. What if the logo became ubiquitous and synonymous with all the great things we are doing in the community?

What are some things that you can do to help?

1. Use old fashioned evangelism to make people aware of what we are doing—tell them.
2. Become a part of the newly formed Marketing Team. Just let me know you want to be a part of something big that is happening in the life of our church. I'll sign you up, and you can be as involved as you would like. No lifetime commitment!
3. Like everything you see from the church on social media. Then share everything the church posts on social media. If everyone shared the posts for the May Breakfast or Yard Sale (for instance)- then we would be reaching so many more people. The more you SHARE- the more people will have a sense of how much we are doing.

The church has a new pastor. And from what I gather- people are saying that there is a feeling of renewed hope and a new spirit in the life of the congregation. This is a great time to grow the church! This is a great time to tell folks about what is happening in the life of our church.

Please consider joining the Marketing Team. Maybe we won't grow the church into a Mega Church—but everyone in town will know that we are an amazing force for God's good in the community.

Did You Know?

After the second precinct was formed in the eastern district of the Town of Attleborough, (in other words, us), one of the first orders of business was to erect a proper meeting house. At that time most churches did not look as we know them today. Most were plain

wooden structures with hard wooden benches and no steeple. It was the Congregational churches that first began the use of cushions to make it more comfortable for those long-ago posteriors.

Our first meeting house was located on the common about where the veterans' monuments are today. You can see a representation of it in the narthex. By 1825 that original building had fallen into disrepair and the church decided that a new church needed to be built. That building was the white church which served us well for 129 years. In the meantime, of course, the red brick church was built and the two stood side by side for a half century. By 1954 the old white church was falling apart, the building needed a new roof, and the old timbers were infested with termites. The decision was made to tear it down and build what we now know as Fellowship Hall.


