#### PASTOR'S MESSAGE New Life!

In a recent sermon I mentioned that in several churches there is a great amount of anxiety about the future of the church. Pastors and parishioners are struggling with the hope of tomorrow. I understand that—but I think that Second church is on a wonderful course. We are trending in the right direction. The church recently voted to increase the <sup>3</sup>/<sub>4</sub> time pastor to full time, and that is a testament to the wonderful ministry that is taking place by **ALL** the ministers at Second!

While I appreciate your confidence and faith in the ministry I provide, this article isn't about that. It is about a church I served, and maybe a lesson we all could take away from it.

I served the congregational church in South Deerfield, MA from 2002 to 2008. It was a wonderful time of growth for the church, and this pastor. After six years, I felt that I had taken them as far as I could, and the next phase of growth would have to come from another pastor. My advice when leaving was, "move quickly to hire a new settled pastor." They didn't. What began was a slippery slope of decline complete with a couple interim ministers, a slow search committee, and a process mired in indecision and wordsmithing. They started from a strong position, and by the time they got around to hiring, they could no longer afford a full-time pastor. The pool of candidates got very shallow.

I share all of that—not as a slight to the church or my successors, because I am not sure that the trajectory would have changed if I had stayed. What I hope you take away is what happened next...

But first...they had to cut the new settled pastor's hours even more. He left. They did the interim thing again until they began to examine the process of 'discerning the future.' They were working so hard to **maintain the church building**. They hosted suppers every month, and the energy was sapped. It just wasn't fun anymore. Eventually they voted to dissolve the church. They would begin the legal process to officially close their doors.

I received a note from a member asking if there was anything from the church that I could use at the church I was currently serving. They were giving it all away! They wanted other churches to benefit: choir robes, hymnals, pews, pianos—everything but the kitchen sink, although if I asked for that... I did ask for the pulpit and the sound system.\* Eventually, they donated the church building to the town to be used as a Senior Center, and the pipe organ to a college chapel in New Hampshire.

The closing of that church broke my heart. I thought of all the meaningful ministry that had taken place there. How many weddings, baptisms, funerals—lives were touched over its long history? When they donated the church to the town, I thought that was the end of it. *The town will never use it. It needs way too much work. It isn't really that handicap accessible. It is just going to sit and waste away and eventually be a very unpleasant reminder that it isn't open anymore.* 

I just learned that an affluent private school made a \$200,000 donation and with a grant of \$100,000, and a wealth of volunteer work- the old church has been transformed! Alas, new life!

Easter is a reminder to us of new life. Sometimes the winter seems really long. When the harvest has been reaped and the cold winds of fall begin to chill our bones, and life seems like it is going to be dormant for some time—know that God is still working. I don't think it was God's will that the church close or that this series of events should unfold the way it did. But it did! Now the town of South Deerfield is going to have an amazingly beautiful, updated, accessible Senior Center. For many who will use it in the coming years, it may just feel like going home. I hope it conjures memories of a most blessed time in their lives.

I write this article with gratitude for all that God has done and will continue to do. Again, I am sad that the congregational church is no longer there, and I live with regrets that perhaps I could have done more. But today, I am so proud of what has become there. God is doing a new thing.

\*They were excited to give me both the pulpit and the sound system. The church I was serving at the time didn't have a quality sound system, and I chose the one in South Deerfield when I was there. The pulpit at the church I was serving at the time was built for a pastor who was 6'6". I used to have to stand on a hidden plywood box to preach. Because the wood matched, the church was happy to receive the gift.

#### **BOOK DISCUSSION GROUP**

We will resume our reading of the book, *Giving Christianity Back to Agape Love*, by Matthew Carriker. We had started the book before Lent with the understanding that we would use a different book during Lent and return to *Giving Christianity Back* in the spring. Well spring has sprung. We will meet each **Tuesday** night beginning on **May 7<sup>th</sup> through June 18<sup>th</sup>**. Each meeting will go from **6 to 7 pm**.

The book helps to dispel the many dogmatic, fear-based belief systems, myths and misinterpretations that have arisen over time in the name of God and Jesus. The book provides a solid understanding grounded in the deep wisdom of what was intended to be the true messages and teachings of Jesus. There are copies of the book in the office, or they can be ordered online.

### **BRING A FRIEND TO CHURCH SUNDAY**

The theme of the worship service on **May 5<sup>th</sup>** is "friends," so why not bring a friend to church on that Sunday. If you like what we are doing - worship, education, ministry and service, fellowship - then why not share it with others. This is the best way to grow a church. You could say something like, "Hey, we are doing this thing at my church on Sunday called 'Bring a Friend to Church Sunday.' It's a great church. You don't have to come every week, just this Sunday. Let's go to church, and then I'll take you to lunch afterwards. Or if you prefer, I'll take you to breakfast first." Of course, you would have to make good on that promise. Who refuses a free meal?

Let's face it; we are in the center of Attleboro. We have been here for quite some time. Most people know that there is a big red brick church that both hosts a pre-school and plays bells on the hour. We are not hiding behind the railroad arches. All that to say - it is going to take a personal invitation from a friend to get people to cross the threshold into this church. New members just joined the church in April. The next group of new members are our friends, and the only way they will come to church is if YOU invite them!

## **DID YOU KNOW?**

Happy Easter, or has Easter even occurred vet? After all, twenty centuries have passed since that glorious day when our Savior cheated death and arose from the dead. Do we really know the exact day? Do we even know why it is called Easter? I don't know if the day was even called Easter. Sometime in the middle of the eighth century in England, there was a scholar named Bede. He was often referred to as the Venerable Bede, and he was the one who decided that the day should be named after the ancient Anglo-Saxon goddess of Spring. Her name was Eoster, and you can see the similarity of names.

But just when was Easter? The Last Supper occurred on the evening before the Passover, and Jesus was crucified the next day. In the earliest days, the first Christians celebrated his resurrection on the date of the Jewish holiday, but there was a problem. Passover is a movable feast and can occur anytime between March 22<sup>nd</sup> and April 25<sup>th</sup>. Easter is also a movable holiday.

For the first few centuries, Christianity was illegal and was prohibited by Roman law. In 325 CE, Emperor Constantine called the Council of Nicea to settle the issue once and for all. He wanted Christianity and Judaism to be completely separate and Easter would no longer coincide with Passover. They also decided that Easter had to be on a Sunday, and that would also create Good Friday. Easter would henceforth be on the Sunday after the first full moon after the spring equinox.

Things seemed to have settled down at least until the sixteenth century when the new Gregorian calendar was adopted, at least in the western part of the world, while the old Julian calendar, which dated from Roman times, was still accepted in the eastern countries. For this reason, Easter is still celebrated on two different dates depending on your church.

There have been other calendar changes throughout the centuries, but the most important thing is that we never forget what we are celebrating, remembering that Jesus gave his life for us.

I do hope you all had a Happy Easter.
