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Pastor's Message

Many of you have seen the bumper sticker or magnet on cars, **"Keep Christ in Christmas."** It's a fairly popular slogan. Maybe you've seen its companion, **"Jesus is the reason for the season."**

I love those- but I wonder if we truly understand what that means. I think the popular meaning of it may be, "Don't turn Christmas into a commercial venture," or "Don't forget to go to church at Christmas time." It's hard not to applaud those very simple statements. I, too, would love it if everyone got back to a very simple Christmas and attended a worship service or two throughout the Advent and Christmas seasons. But I really do want to challenge the slogan of "Keep Christ in Christmas."

It all has to start with 'What are your assumptions about Christ?' and 'What is the meaning of Christmas?'

If you want to keep Christ in Christmas, then you must answer, 'Who is Christ?' Is it just the baby in a manger? Is it the prophet, healer, teacher, Messiah, Savior? If it is all of those things- then we simply must take into consideration His words and actions throughout His life! This is where your personal understanding about Jesus comes to life! It's more than the Christmas pageant baby sleeping in a stable. Keeping Christ in Christmas is about the gift of an entire life.

Here is a great way to 'keep Christ in Christmas,' based on the 9 key teachings of Jesus (from Kurt Struckmeyer, An Unorthodox Faith).

Radical Love**Lavish Generosity****Extravagant Forgiveness****Inclusive Hospitality****Compassionate Action****Selfless Service****A Passion for Justice****Creative Non-Violence****Simple Living**

Yes! If you want to keep Christ in Christmas, then practice the above statements! That's who my Jesus is—that's what my Jesus taught—those are the teachings of Jesus that I want to cling to. However, you may have a different understanding of Jesus' teachings and the way he modeled his life.

Hope, Peace, Love, Joy are the names of the four Sundays of Advent. Each week we light a candle of the Advent Wreath as the excitement builds. Let the challenge of Advent this year- move you towards keeping Christ in Advent, Christmas, Epiphany and beyond....

If you find it hard to come up with ways to live out the 9 key teachings of Jesus, then simplify and live out the four themes of Advent—and then you will arrive at Christmas, ready for the gift.

If you truly recognize that Jesus is the reason for the season, and you want to keep Christ in Christmas- then practice what He preached!

Have a very Merry Advent and a blessed Christmas!

THE TIME FOR THE YOUNG AND YOUNG AT HEART

The following was used for The Time for the Young and Young at Heart during the November 23 worship service: I want to share something that I came up with: the “Spectrum of Caring.”

At Confirmation Retreats we did an exercise called the Spectrum Activity. We would say something and then invite kids to line up or go to a corner of the room, depending on their opinion.

For instance: Pineapple can go on pizza....

I strongly agree on one side... strongly disagree on the other side

Indifferent or No Opinion would be in the middle of the room.

We would ask the young people to explain or defend their stance.

The “Spectrum of Caring” might help you to determine where you or someone else could stand on an issue. Are you an...

Activist – Advocate – Ally – Ambivalent – Against - Antagonist

Using the pizza example, you may find yourself somewhere on this spectrum.

Perhaps you want to promote Hawaiian Pizza—you might start a fruit pizza club. Start a support group. You may charter an organization. You hold meetings. Maybe you even create a march on Washington to raise awareness for your cause. That would make you—an activist!

But be prepared—because there are people who violently oppose pineapple on pizza. They will troll your group. They will call you an extremist—or much worse. Every time a Hawaiian Pizza lover posts something, the Antagonist will call them out.

Maybe you just want to advocate for fruit on pizza. Perhaps you have a meatless bias.

Maybe you just want to support your friends who dig Hawaiian pizza and you can’t understand why people just can’t let you be you. Your pineapple and pork preference doesn’t infringe on their love pepperoni or anchovies.

You pick the issue—you are going to fall somewhere on the Spectrum of Caring.

You should. That means you care about things. You should care about things.

But this should also help us to understand where other people stand. It’s okay to not be an activist. It’s definitely okay to not be an antagonist.

If you don’t care about anything—or look more deeply—then you are letting others make decisions and frame the issues.

Pizza toppings don’t matter a whole lot at the end of the day. But there are a lot of things that do matter. Speak up for the things that really matter. Stand beside those who need support. Share why you care.

Music Notes

CHOIR SCHEDULES

The Bell Choir and the Adult Choir will rehearse on Thursdays, December 4, 11, and 18, at the regular times. There will be no rehearsals on December 25 and January 1.

The Adult Choir will sing on all the Sundays in December (7, 14, 21, and 28) and on January 4. The Bell Choir will play on Christmas Eve (but the Adult Choir will not sing then).

Looking further ahead, the choirs will not rehearse on Thursdays, January 8 and 15, and the Adult Choir will not sing on Sunday, January 11 (Bill will be away), but will sing on Sunday, January 18. Regular rehearsals for the Bell Choir and the Adult Choir will resume on Thursday, January 22.

THOUGHTS ON POSTLUDES

A few weeks ago, after the worship service and in coffee hour, I received more than the usual number of

comments and questions about that Sunday's Postlude. I wasn't bothered at all, because they were great questions, from people who obviously had been listening closely.

In fact, I was somewhat relieved, since the service had run unusually long. There had been many announcements about stewardship, along with a dedication, to the late Dr. David Buttrick, of the new AEDs. Earlier that week, I had made a cut in the music, shortening it from 6 minutes to around 4. But when it came time for the Postlude, I was worried that even an abbreviated version that began at 11:10 would be too much. (Not to mention that sheet cake that was waiting in Fellowship Hall!)

Since the COVID lockdown and the beginning of livestreaming, one factor in my choice of Postlude music has been length. I generally want a piece that lasts no longer than 3 or 4 minutes and one that's somewhat enlivening and pleasant to listen to. I'm genuinely appreciative that the congregation sits and listens to the Postlude – thank you very much! I'm not sure how and when that started. I certainly did not ask for it myself. I think it just happened, and then, at some point, the note in the bulletin about leaving quietly was added (again, I didn't request or write the "rules").

Getting back to the Postlude on November 9: Given the lateness of the hour, I was also concerned that the piece was a bit more serious and "dark" than many of my choices. So, here's why listeners' questions surprised me. First, people wanted to know how to say the composer's last name: Buxtehude. (Book – stə – hoo' – də) ("hoo" rhyming with "moo"). And who was this guy anyway?

Dieterich Buxtehude (1637-1707) was the most famous organist and church musician in North Germany in the late 17th century. He was Danish by birth but eventually became the organist and music director at the Marienkirche in Lübeck, a wealthy trading city on the north coast, near Hamburg. The church's organs were large and famous. Buxtehude – aside from his musical talent – got the post by marrying the daughter of the previous organist, Franz Tunder. Near the end of Buxtehude's life, he offered his job – with the same

conditions of marriage to his own daughter – to Handel, who, for some reason, left Lübeck the day after his arrival.

Ultimately, Buxtehude became J. S. Bach's most influential teacher, especially with regards to music for the organ. In 1705 the 20-year-old Bach took a one-month leave of absence from his church post in central Germany to travel about 250 miles (probably by walking and hitchhiking on farm wagons) to Lübeck. Bach's return to his post – about 3 months later – did not sit well with the church administrators.

Listeners to the November 9 Postlude also noted the dramatic, mysterious and improvisatory nature of Buxtehude's Praeludium in D: sudden loud deep pedal notes coming out of nowhere, virtuosic scales and pedal passages, dark harmonies. My response to those comments was: If you compare Bach's famous Toccata and Fugue in D Minor (BWV 565), you'll recognize Buxtehude's influence right away. (If you don't know it by its title, it's the "Halloween-ish" piece that often gets played or referenced in spooky movies or musicals: Captain Nemo playing his submarine organ, or the Phantom of the Opera, or countless other instances). Its dramatic opening is iconic: three descending half-scales, one octave apart, followed by the low pedal D and a rising dissonant broken chord above it. This is one of Bach's early organ works, and the style is a direct borrow from Buxtehude. Once more I want to say thanks for listening (patiently sometimes, I'm sure). I love questions – ask anytime. I do try to keep Postludes brief and ear-catching, but I also prefer to play genuine organ music, i.e., pieces written specifically for the organ. And that's not only because I'm an organist by personal enthusiasm and training, but also because Second Church is fortunate to have the largest, most versatile pipe organ in Attleboro – and I like to use it to its fullest.
