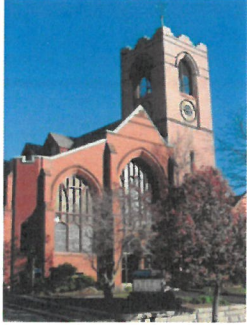

### *From the Pastor’s Desk:*

Years ago, I was involved in some major changes with the Massachusetts Conference. At one of our meetings, we were told to build a new ‘bicycle’ (a metaphor). The parts were all the traditional elements associated with the Conference: Christian Education, Mission and Outreach, Social Justice, Worship, Stewardship, etc. Unfortunately, we couldn’t seem to get out of heads what a ‘bicycle’ looked like, so we ended up stripping all the parts off and then building the same bicycle.

What did the Apostles do after the death and resurrection of Jesus? They tried to figure it out. There were so many questions. Jesus did not give them instructions about how to build a church. He didn’t lay out a strategic plan, create bylaws, or institute parliamentary procedure when the disciples gathered. Their aim wasn’t to create a church or construct a cathedral. Their goal seemed to be: build a community of the faithful. At first, it was centered around worship and then it moved into mission (take care of those in the community). Eventually it evolved into evangelism, and finally, some said, “Maybe we should record what Jesus said and did.”

While in seminary I volunteered to help out a local church with their youth group. Another person also volunteered at the same time. At the very first meeting, four high school aged kids showed up. After the introductions, my co-leader jumped in with, “Okay, so let’s create some bylaws!” I can only imagine what those four kids thought.

What if Peter said, “Fellow Apostles, if we want to make our religion appealing to the masses we are going to need bylaws.” Thomas would reply, “I doubt that.”

Folks, bylaws we have. Bylaws we need. And we need to update our church bylaws periodically. There is a team of dedicated folks who are in the process of doing just that. No worries—you will not be enlisted at this point.

The bylaws represent a system. The system worked for many years, but tweaks need to be made to the system from time to time. You can’t keep doing things the same way and expect different results (that is the definition of insanity, right?). If the church is looking for different results, then we need to change more than a staff person or a committee member. The current system was structured in a very different time. In one church I served, the committee met during the day which excluded people who worked. Some of you might remember when committees could only be served by men. The church will never be accused of being early adopters but if we adapt too late, then we might completely miss our window. (Also, this is why it is recommended that the bylaws be reviewed every 5 years.)

So, yes, there are some changes coming. Change can be your nemesis or your friend, or, to borrow a dated term, ‘your frenemy.’ Anything that gets changed can be changed again.

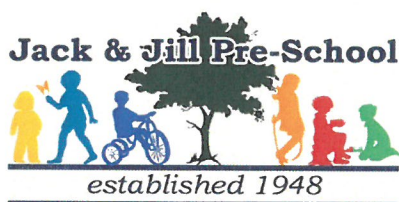

A highlight of April was our recognition of Earth Day, when presentations at coffee hour included beekeepers, who shared their “pollinator” knowledge and experience with us (and Enoch Osborne got to try on the protective suit--see photos). Outreach and Missions will continue to supply tips for becoming better stewards of earth's resources (look for them both in the monthly Voice as well as in the weekly bulletins). The first tip (and foundation for many others): Watch the free National Geographic movie **Before the Flood**, featuring Leonardo DiCaprio. Just go to our church website and click on the movie graphic to access lots of good info and good motivation to do a new thing. No one can do it all, but together we can do so much to promote climate justice.



Our O&M team continues to learn about and contribute to Attleboro community resources. Connie Eckart attends regular Self-Sufficiency Coalition meetings and reports that planning for next year's warming shelter season has already begun; this past

season, the warming shelter was open 34 nights. In total 38 individuals were served, with an average of 17 a night. Thanks to our church members who assisted in this important service.

Ken Hill has attended the Food Access coalition meetings sponsored by the YMCA, so we can be more knowledgeable about and better integrated into the community programs related to food. ## COMMUNITY NOTES

### THE CHOSEN DISCUSSION GROUP - AN UPDATE

For the second year in a row we began weekly discussions on The Chosen in January. It is a presentation of the Gospels with a story line in a way that has never before been done. The series is presently filming the seventh and final installment which will focus on the events following Jesus' crucifixion. When completed, there will be 56 episodes in all...all of which are "crowd funded" ( not by Hollywood or corporations). To date, nearly four-hundred million people have viewed all or parts of the series and it has changed lives around the world...including numerous actors who are involved in the filming.

This year, our group includes 13 folks from Immanuel Lutheran Church on Rt. 152 as well as a few people from this Church as well. Almost everyone has already viewed the 40 episodes that are presently available and our discussions are animated and filled with questions, fun, sharing of faith and a deepened

understanding of Jesus and his teachings. We meet every Wednesday from 6:30-7:30 ( though some folks like to stay later to discuss what we have been doing.)

Our discussions begin or end with prayer and focus on seasons one and two on the events and situations we see. As seasons three and four unfold, we notice how the individual followers of Jesus (and others) start to change their actions as they take on Jesus' teachings and begin forming personal relationships with each other, sometimes by dealing with anger or misunderstanding. By season four and five, we also see how this group begins to form a community of love in which they support and show concern for each other as they follow Jesus' teachings which they hear in personal interactions and through his sermons ( Sermon of the Mount; The feeding of the 5000; his interactions with the Pharisees).

Season five ends with Judas' betrayal in the Garden of Olives. In the series, the creator/director Dallas Jenkins has created stories to fill in the gospels. Anything that he does, however, is vetted by scripture scholars of the Jewish, Protestant and Catholic faiths. This includes all the scripts and how things will be presented. And the story-lines reflect Jesus teachings and his own actions as well.

I know some folks who have not seen the series are concerned that what is made up will confuse what is in the Gospels. All added story-lines are consistent with Jesus' teachings. They simply depict events that reflect the gospels. Dallas Jenkins continually reminds people to READ THE GOSPELS. That is a major purpose in doing the series.

Finally, our discussion group, after weeks, reaches a point where people are free to share personal experiences that they connect to either a character in the series or to an event or particular story-line. This is a way of making the Gospels more personal...relating Jesus, his messages and the series to one's life. That is the point of Jesus being sent to us. To redeem us so we might enter the Kingdom of God and to show us how to live our lives based on his actions and his teachings.

In the process of questioning, viewing and sharing, the group comes together at a pretty deep level and shares appreciation, understanding and support.

Just as the series depicts strangers learning to form community by listening to Jesus, so too, does our group. This is what is happening all around the world and not just with Christians. The series has made a significant impact in Israel, South America, India and many other places and is in the Guinness Book of Records as the MOST TRANSLATED MEDIA EVENT EVER, reaching the world in over 65 languages and dialects. Their goal is 300!

Season six will be out on PRIME this November, though the last two episodes depicting the Crucifixion will be held out until next Easter. And please know, I am available anytime for any questions you might have.
